Welcome back! We hope you have had a lovely summer break and are rested and ready for the new year in school.

Maths and English

English

In English this term we will be exploring historical



narrative through the novel War Horse, and learning how to write effective recounts. In our guided reading lessons, we will be working on our inference and deduction skills. Through our English work we will develop our

knowledge of spellings, punctuation and grammar (spag), and we will work on our use of a cursive script in handwriting practice.

Maths

In maths this term we will be solving a range of number and practical problems involving numbers up to ten million, using formal calculation methods for the four operations. Although we will be prac-

tising our multiplication facts in school, the quicker the children can recall these facts, the easier they will find the whole maths curriculum. Please encourage your child to practise these at home. Thank you.



Other subjects

Our topic work this term is about WW1: The Great War. As it is 100 years since the end of WW1, the children will be finding out about the roles and responsibilities of the people involved and how it has impacted on the society we live in today. Our science topic is 'What would a journey through your body look like?'. This involves looking at the main parts and function of the human circulatory system. In

RE, our topic is 'Can religions build a fair world?'. In citizenship, our theme is 'Being healthy'. In PE, we will be developing our coordination and agility and in German, we will learn greetings, classroom commands and numbers. In computing we

will be developing our basic skills and in art we will be creating pictures using natural materials. In music, we will continue to develop our understanding of rhythm and musical notations.



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Fluency and Reasoning

Fluency and Reasoning is a new version of the 'Rapid Number Recall' program that we have used for the last few years. It is based on the belief that if children are proficient in their fluency and reasoning skills, they will find all other areas of the maths curriculum much easier. For example, when being asked to find out the fraction of an amount, if they have a good understanding of their multiplication facts, they will find this much easier.

Each week will begin with a CLIC sheet which children will complete. The questions that they get wrong will then determine the skills that they focus on in daily practice, during afternoon register. When children get all questions correct on a CLIC sheet, they can move onto the next step.

You will find a record sheet for the step that your child is working on in their reading journal. Please encourage your child to practise the step they are working on at home as part of their homework, because the more they do, the quicker they will achieve!

BOOK SWAP FRIDAY!

Book Swap Friday is to continue this year, and will be run by the newly appointed Literacy Committee. This will happen on the first Friday of every month, beginning in October. On Book Swap Friday, children are welcome to bring into school a book/books (NOT school library books) that they have finished reading and swap it/them for a new book that another child has brought in. Please make sure that books that your children bring to Book Swap Friday are in a reasonable condition so that another child can enjoy reading them!

Reading journals

Children in Year 5 and 6 are given reading journals instead of reading diaries. We ask that they take the time each week to complete a minimum of 5 entries in their journal, including entries using the prompt sheets glued into their journal, as part of their homework. Please see the information sheet glued into your child's journal for further information. We cannot stress enough the importance of reading at home regularly, even once children are fluent readers, so that they continue to develop vital skills such as inference and deduction. These skills enable them to reach the expected standard in reading at the end of KS2, but more importantly to navigate their way around a range of texts across the curriculum, throughout their school life.

Year 5/6 staff

She will be working with children of a range of abilities throughout the year. Children will be taught by her for a week at a time, to maximize the impact on their learning. We are very lucky to be supported by such excellent and dedicated TAs in Year 5/6!


Science enrichment

Times tables

We cannot emphasis enough the importance of children being able to recall the times table facts (up to 12 x 12) and the related division facts.

This is not only important for end of key stage assessments, but because a secure knowledge of these facts will help the children across all areas of the maths curriculum. Those children who are not able to recall the times table facts and the related division facts up to 12 x 12 will struggle in other areas of maths, and are unlikely to meet age related expectations in maths at the end of KS2.

In line with our homework

policy, please encourage your child to learn the times tables and the related division facts. Please speak to your child's class teacher if you would like some support with this. Thank you.


Recommended Reads

When both of Eddie Dickens's parents catch a disease that makes them turn yellow, go a bit crinkly round the edges and smell of hot water bottles,


