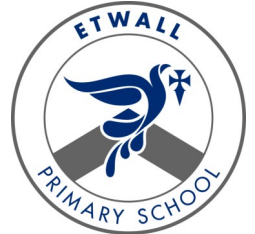

Welcome back

We hope you have had a lovely half term holiday and are rested and ready for the busy term ahead. Now the weather is getting colder remember children will need a coat and hat and gloves for outdoor activities.

Special points to remember:

- * PE kits need to be in school every day.
- * Learning Diaries and books in school every day,
- * Read at least five times a week.
- * Phoneme keyrings are updated weekly.
- * Water bottles and afternoon snack daily.
- * Swimming day is Wednesday. Hopefully this will start during November. We will keep you informed.

Online Safety

It is important that we keep our children safe when they use the internet. Here are some tips:

Put yourself in control Make use of the parental controls available on your home broadband and any internet-enabled devices. You can find out how at your broadband provider's website or by visiting internetmatters.org.

Set your homepage to a

child-friendly site such as CBeebies and give them a user account which only allows access to sites you've chosen. Explore these different sites together.

Children can now have a digital footprint before they learn to speak and often before they're even born. 81% of mothers have uploaded an image of their child under 2 to social media sites. Zero to eight: Young children and their internet use -

In December we will be thinking about winter and what happens when the weather changes. This will include preparing for our Christmas production. The children will be learning snowmen songs and creating a wintery display.

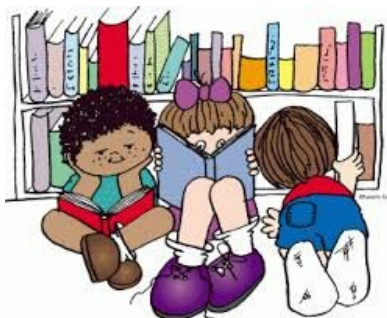


Reading

Thank you to all the parents who are making regular comments in the Learning Diaries Little and often is definitely the best approach and already some of the children are beginning to blend CVC (consonant, vowel, consonant) words and read some of

the tricky words too. Remember please that we look for four or five entries into the diaries each week.

Please also ensure your child's reading book, diary, sound key rings are in their book bags be updated where necessary.



Remember to read other books and to visit the local library.

Phonics



Last term the children worked really hard on their listen skills and have shown they are great at rhyming. We are now moving onto learning the phonemes. The children are joining in with the Jolly Phonics songs with enthusiasm and are using the phonemes to blend words together. We are also starting to write the letters, words and even short captions.

Try phonics play or pocket phonics on tablets at home.

Mathematics



We are still enjoying our regular maths and counting activities.

We are exploring numbers beyond 10 and have played SPLAT on a 100 square. Help your child to recognize numerals to 20 using the number cards that were sent home. Then extend this to numbers to 100. Look for numbers all around and talk about how many.

Snacks



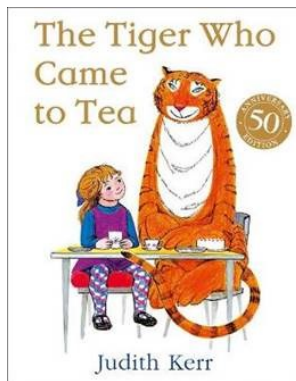
Your child will be provided with a healthy morning snack, as part of the free school fruit and vegetable scheme. They may also bring a snack for afternoon play, which can be kept in their drawer. Send the snack in a small bag rather than a large food box. The snacks they bring in must be healthy and unprocessed, e.g. a piece of fruit, vegetable, cheese or dried fruit. (Remember we are a nut-free school.)

Also until the end of the month of your child's 5th birthday, your child is provided with free milk. **If you wish your child to continue to have milk please ask at the office.** There is drinking water available.

Recommended Reads



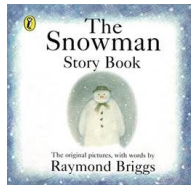
The Tiger who came to tea- Judith Kerr
