Maths and English

Remember:

- * PE kits need to be in school every day.
- * Reading diaries will be checked every Tuesday.
- * Swimming is on Tuesday.
- * Spelling test is every Tues- be working on our inferday. Please support your child in learning their spellings. Children will often be asked to learn a rule to apply to their spellings.
- * Children will have mental maths and writing targets glued into their reading diaries. Times table are also expected to be practiced every week.
- * Please can you ensure that your child always has an old shirt/apron in their PE bag for art and design lessons, as they can get quite messy!

English

In English this term we will be exploring historical narrative (War Horse) and explanations. In our guided reading lessons, we will Maths ence and deduction skills. Through our English work we will develop our knowledge of spellings,



punctuation and grammar (spag), and we will work on our use of a cursive script in handwriting practice.

In maths this term we will be solving a range of number and practical problems involving numbers beyond 1000, using formal calculation methods for the four operations. Although we will be practising our multipli-

cation facts in school, the quicker the children can recall these facts, the easier they will find the whole maths curriculum. Please encourage your child to practise these at home. Thank you.

Computing will be developing our basic skills and in art we will be creating pictures using natural materials. In music, we will continue to develop our rhythm and musical notations.

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Fluency and Reasoning

Fluency and Reasoning is based on the belief that if children are proficient in their fluency and reasoning skills, they will find all other areas of the maths curriculum much easier. For example, when being asked to find out the fraction of an amount, if they have a good understanding of their multiplication facts, they will find this much easier.

The programme is based on a series of steps, and within each step there are several objectives. Your child's teacher will initially tell your child where they will start and then they will work through the steps in order.

You will find the step that your child is working on, and the target within that step, in their reading journal, along with ideas about how you can help them to achieve this target. Children will also have time to practice these in school, but obviously the more help they get the quicker they will achieve!

Each target has a 24 question quiz that children will be asked to complete at least once a week. When they can get 100% three times, children will move on to the next target. The progress your child is making will be recorded in their reading diaries so that you can share their successes with them.


We often get asked if we can recommend any websites that your child could go on to help them with their school work. Here are a couple that you might find useful:

PG films

Throughout the year the children may be watching clips from PG films to support their learning. If you have any questions about this, please come and see your child's class teacher.



Grammar

Some of the areas we will be looking at this year are:

Relative clauses beginning with who, which, where, when, whose, that, or an omitted relative pronoun (for example: The teacher, who has been teaching for a long time, is looking forward to the new school year).

Indicating degrees of possibility using adverbs [for example, perhaps, surely] or modal verbs [for example, might, should, will, must] adverbials of time [for example, later], place [for example, nearby] and number [for example, secondly].

Use of the semi-colon, colon and dash to mark the boundary between sentences [for example, It's raining; I'm fed up].

Use of commas to clarify meaning. The difference between vocabulary typical of informal speech and vocabulary appropriate for formal speech and writing [for example, find out -

discover; ask for – request; go in – enter] How words are related by meaning as synonyms and antonyms [for example, big, large, little].


Brackets, dashes or commas to show part of a sentence.


Then, on Harry's eleventh birthday, a strange man bursts in with some important news: Harry Potter is a wizard and has been awarded a place to study at Hogwarts.
