"The breadth of the subject matter and the level of detail the children are presented with."





Key actions in response to the survey:

- Team leaders to ensure the RSHE that has been missed due to lockdown(s) is caught up before the new academic year to ensure there are not gaps in knowledge. This is especially important for our year 6s.
- Communicate with parents regularly about PSHE/RSHE topicsthis survey emphasises that parents/ carers want to be made aware (preferably prior to the lesson taking place) so that they can join in the discussion.
- Parents/ carers would like hints and tips with answering 'sensitive' questions at home- especially in response to what their child is being taught in school. Bear this in mind when planning PSHE/ RSHE lessons.
- Be open about any resources you are using in the classroom. Again, this allows for the discussions to continue at home.
- Year 5 & 6- a live session with parents would be beneficial to share the resources that will be used to teach about changes in the body and reproduction.
- Be aware of what is covered in our PSHE/ RSHE curriculum. (The RSHE strand spirals through our PSHE scheme of work-PSHE Matters)
- Be familiar with our RSHE policy so that we are communicating one clear message with both children and parents.
