In RE, our topic is 'Can religions build a fair world?'. In citizenship, our theme is 'Being Healthy'. In PE, we will be developing our coordination and agility. In music, we will continue to develop our rhythm and musical notations.

Fluency and Reasoning

Fluency and Reasoning is a new version of the 'Rapid Number Recall' program that we have used for the last few years. It is based on the belief that if children are proficient in their fluency and reasoning skills, they will find all other areas of the maths curriculum much easier. For example, when being asked to find out the fraction of an amount, if they have a good understanding of their multiplication facts, they will find this much easier.

Each week will begin with a CLIC sheet which children will complete. The questions that they get wrong will then determine the skills that they focus on in daily practice, during afternoon register. When children get all questions correct on a CLIC sheet, they can move onto the next step.

You will find a record sheet for the step that your child is working on in their reading journal. Please encourage your child to practise the step they are working on at home as part of their homework, because the more they do, the quicker they will achieve!

Year 5/6 staff

The teachers in Years 5/6 this year are Mrs Dhillon (Ospreys), Miss Warburton (Eagles) and Miss Marriott (Sparrowhawks). Our teaching assistants are Mrs Hall, who has worked in Year 5/6 for two years and has worked as a TA for many years, Mrs Cheetham, who is a HLTA (higher level teaching assistant), and has worked in Y5/6 for many years and Miss Jacobs, who has also worked as a TA for many years. Again this year, starting later in the term, Mrs Cheetham will be taking out groups of Year 5/6 children to teach maths and English lessons in the library. These lessons will be planned by the class teachers. She will be working with children of a range of abilities throughout the year. Children will be taught by her for a week at a time, to maximize the impact on their learning. We are very lucky to be supported by such excellent and dedicated TAs in Year 5/6!

Reading journals

Children in Year 5 and 6 are given reading journals instead of reading diaries. We ask that they take the time each week to complete a minimum of 5 entries in their journal, including entries using the prompt sheets glued into their journal, as part of their homework. Please see the information sheet glued into your child's journal for further information. We cannot stress enough the importance of reading at home regularly, even once children are fluent readers, so that they continue to develop vital skills such as inference and deduction. These skills enable them to reach the expected standard in reading at the end of KS2, but more importantly to navigate their way around a range of texts across the curriculum, throughout their school life.

Grammar

Some of the areas we will be looking at this year are:

Relative clauses beginning with who, which, where, when, whose, that, or an omitted relative pronoun (for example: The teacher, who has been teaching for a long time, is looking forward to the new school year).

Indicating degrees of possibility using adverbs [for example, perhaps, surely] or modal verbs [for example, might, should, will, must] adverbials of time [for example, later], place [for example, nearby] and number [for example, secondly].

Use of the semi-colon, colon and dash to mark the boundary between sentences [for example, It's raining; I'm fed up].

Use of commas to clarify meaning. The difference between vocabulary typical of informal speech and vocabulary appropriate for formal speech and writing [for example, find out - discover; ask for – request; go in – enter] How words are related by meaning as **synonyms** and **antonyms** [for example, big, large, little]. **Brackets, dashes** or **commas** to show part of a sentence.
