Year 6 Primary Team Maths Challenge at John Port

The best mathematicians from across the primary feeder schools took part in the third annual Primary Team Maths Challenge. Fifty six students entered a challenging five hour marathon of head scratching problems and puzzles. The UK Mathematics Trust provided the resources for the competition which tests mathematical skills, team work and cooperation. Rounds included a group section in which pupils had fifteen questions to answer in just forty-five minutes, a cross number round - a numerical version of a crossword, and a logic round in which pupils had to

work out the surnames, pets, children, car colour and holidays of five different families. A relay round also combined exercise with maths and teams split up and answered questions against the clock.

After a very closely fought contest, Etwall Primary School lifted the trophy with Repton Primary School as runners up. John Port were delighted that so many young gifted mathematicians are 'rising to the challenge' and discovering their talents.

PENCIL CASES IN KS2


Class teachers have had a few unnecessary issues with children's pencil cases this year. Some children are bringing in many of the items provided by school eg pencils, rulers, protractors, pencil crayons, erasers etc. All these items are not needed in school as all stationery that children need for school is provided for them in the classroom. The size of pencil cases have also been a big issue as they do not fit in your child's tray and so are left on tables where they can be very distracting for the children when they are learning, and when things get lost, it creates a lot of upset.



We are therefore going to start the new school year with clear guidelines as to what the children are allowed to bring in school. KS1 children are not allowed to bring pencil cases into school – this will remain unchanged. KS2 will only be allowed to bring in small pencil cases that have to be able to fit into their tray. They will not be allowed to have them out on their desks and any pencil cases that are too big will be sent home. KS2 chn are only allowed to bring in felt tips and/or pencil crayons for their personal use – nothing else will be allowed. Thank you for your support in this matter.

Leon and the Place Between

In September the children will start off the school year with a whole school book called 'Leon and the



Place Between', by Grahame Baker-Smith. All classes will be studying this book for the first two weeks of the Autumn term, and will be doing age-appropriate work around this theme. Look out for displays around school and entries on the school website relating to this work in the new term! On Monday 12th September we are being visited by a magician, who is going to do a history of magic assembly and visit classes throughout the day. Your child may come in fancy dress related to this theme on this day if they wish to, e.g. a magician/wizard/ magical theme so they can really get into the theme of the day. We look forward to starting the new school year off with an exciting theme.

Soccer Stars Tournament

Seven, Y5 children took part in a Soccer Stars tournament at Derby University. We all had a great day, and played lots of matches! Some great goals were scored by Leo, and some fantastic saves made by Maddie. The rest of the team played really well too. Assessment Roundup

You will have all received your child's school report by now and have had the opportunity to speak to the class teacher on Open Evening. The school values the progress and development that each child makes in many areas – not just academic – and I hope this is communicated to you on a regular basis. We are working together to support your child in becoming a well-rounded, responsible citizen who values their education and lifelong learning, who feels part of the multi-faith and multi-cultural society in which we live and can show respect for others and have high standards for themselves. We are proud to be a school that warmly welcomes parents and children from around the world and we cherish the cultural enrichment that this brings to the school as a whole. We see this very much as a positive for our school and for the children in it. Central government will decide on the best course of action following the referendum regarding coming out of the EU, but we will continue to welcome and embraces diversity and inclusion at Etwall Primary School.

GOVERNOR CORNER

We are very proud of the schools end of year results and they have been celebrated in school by the children, staff and school governors. They compare extremely well with the published



national figures which is very pleasing, especially as it has been a year of considerable change and disruption which Miss Dixey described in the information sent home with your child's school report. The governments headline figure of 53% was for Y6 pupils who had achieved a **combined** expected outcome in reading, writing and maths. This illustrates how difficult the tests were and also how much harder the Y6 curriculum now is. **Etwall Primary achieved a combined figure of 74% - 21% higher than the national figure.** The main area that some children did not meet Y6 expected in was writing – this is because the expectations on the children are dramatically different under the new national curriculum which they only started in September 2015.

Writing is a whole school area for development in 2016-17 as we continue to address the higher expectations for each year group across the school. However, we are very proud of the children and await the national figures in comparison.

EYFS attainment was 71% of children reaching a good level of development (ie reached the Early Learning Goals) compared to 66% nationally in 2015. Well done to all the EYFS children!

We are very proud of our Y6 pupils as they have achieved in many different ways as they have come through the school – these results only show one way in which they have developed. Well done to Y6!
