Safeguarding: Safer Stranger, Safer Buildings

Kidscape is committed to keeping children safe. With the help of parents, carers, teachers, police and other caring professionals, children are taught ways to deal with: bullies; good sense; defence; approaches by strangers and even by known adults who may harm them.

Kidscape offers a Helpline for parents of chil-



dren being bullied; publications; child safety training to prevent abuse and bullying; confidence building sessions and advice and information sharing with other caring organisations.

- If you get lost, or feel unsafe, and there is no adult around that you know and trust, look for a safer stranger who you can ask for help. If you can't see a safer stranger outside, look for a safer building you can go in to, to ask for help from the people who work there.
- A safer stranger is a person who is working at their job which helps people. Safer strangers will usually be wearing a uniform. Safer strangers could be police officers, police community support officers, traffic wardens, shopkeepers, check-out assistants, paramedics and others.
- Safer buildings could be banks, post offices, libraries, medical centres, shops, supermarkets,leisure centres and others.

Spring Term 4 Topic: Splish Splash Splosh!

We are learning about Water this half term and how it is needed and used. We will be growing plants and having lots of fun. The children will also be basing some of their work around the story of 'Noah's Ark' which forms a large part of our RE this term. Mathematics



We are developing a daily

quick mental maths activity to support the children in their maths skills. We will focus on counting forwards and backwards to 20. Recognising numerals and the equivalent quantity. We will be using the 100 square and number lines to encourage children to visualize numbers. Also we will look at 2D and 3D shapes. The activities are quick, fun and often include a song. To help at home use number cards to play games and make your own number line.

Golden Rules

This half term we are continuing to promote the Golden Rules. In Reception the children will meet different animals to help them learn about the Golden Rules., The animals are Elsa Elephant says ...You try hard Alfred Alligator says ... You are kind and helpful



Zelda Zebra says ... You are gentle Louis Lion says ... You are honest Mona Monkey says ... You listen well Gino Giraffe says ... You look after things .


Visit Our Website

Boats by Zibi Dobos

Boats' is the latest title added to our flagship series of folding activities for children. With this booklet, the fascinating world of seas and ships is presented to 4 to 6-year-olds. Children can now build by themselves a lighthouse and different kinds of boats: a catamaran, ship, frigate, pleasure yacht! Paper folding is an early-learning activity which is both creative and captivating. Our innovative cutouts introduce children to the art of paper folding, an educational activity that awakens and captivates the imagination while sharpening manual and spatial skills. Children age 4 and above can assemble baper models without scissors, glue or parental assistance. Each booklet consists of stiff card pages featuring pre-cut shapes. Side assembly figures, simple stepby-step instructions and clear fold lines guide the child in completing each model.

Clothing
