





## EYFS:

Here is a selection of the books that we read, but there are many more besides these.






































## Years 1 & 2:

This helps to embed the structure of the story, so that we can mimic it when we come to write our own. We enjoy starting our stories with 'Once upon a time...' and we get this language from these age-old tales.



about how to build a strong house based on The Three Little Pigs.




























#### Y3 & 4:

































#### <u> Y5 & 6:</u>

narrative voices.











