We will be exploring mutual respect and tolerance: treat others as you want to be treated - part of the focus on people & communities, managing feelings & behaviour and making relationships as cited in Personal Social and Emotional Development and Understanding the World: We will be creating an ethos of inclusivity and tolerance



where views, faiths, cultures and races are valued and children are engaged with the wider community. The children will acquire a tolerance and appreciation of and respect for their own and other cultures; know about similarities and differences between themselves and others and among families, faiths, communities, cultures and traditions and share and discuss practices, celebrations and experiences. Staff will explain the importance of tolerant behaviours such as sharing and respecting other's opinions.

Staff will promote diverse attitudes and challenge stereotypes, for example, sharing stories that reflect and value the diversity of children's experiences and providing resources and activities that challenge gender, cultural and racial stereotyping.

Reading at Home: 5 Tips on Hearing Your Child Read

As parents you are your child's most influential teacher with an important part to play in helping your child to learn to read. Here are some suggestions on how you can help to make this a positive experience.

1. Choose a quiet time Set aside a quiet time with no distractions. Ten to fifteen minutes is usually long enough.

2. Make reading enjoyable Make reading an enjoyable experience. Sit with your child. Try not to pressurise if he or she is reluctant. If your child loses interest then do something else.

3. Maintain the flow If your child mispronounces a word do not interrupt immediately. Instead allow opportunity for self-correction. It is better to tell a child some unknown words to maintain the flow rather than insisting on trying to build them all up from the sounds of the letters. If your child does try to 'sound out' words, encourage the use of letter sounds rather than 'alphabet names'.

4. Be positive If your child says something nearly right to start with that is fine. Boost your child's confidence with constant praise for even the smallest achievement.

5. Success is the key. Parents anxious for a child to progress can mistakenly give a child a book that is too difficult. This can have the opposite effect to the one they are wanting. Remember 'Nothing succeeds like success'.

Phonics



All of the EYFS staff continue to be very impressed by the children's phonics development.

The majority of children are now blending and segmenting words and many also learning tricky words. They are now showing this in their writing too.

A big thank you to all parents and carers who have helped with this learning. We will now be concentrating on revising the diagraphs, learning new diagraphs and trigrapghs and developing reading of two syllable words and even more exception words.

Mathematics



We are really enjoying learning about Numbers and most of the children have grasped counting, reading and writing numbers to 10. Now we are moving on to counting to 20 and beyond.

The children will have number cards or 100 squares to use at home and it would be great if you could help the children read larger numbers.

We are also going to be adding and taking away practically and begin to record this using pictures and number sentences.

The children will be exploring length, weight and shape

Being Responsible

This term we will focus Being responsible and how they can contribute to the life of the classroom and school.

Also we will learn that it is important to construct

and explore the importance of rules and that we have responsibilities and rights.

The children will discuss what is fair and unfair, what is right and wrong and the impact of being kind or unkind.



What you can do at home

Number work at home

Children's number skills can be supported in all sorts of fun ways at home. Board games such as snakes and ladders are a great way of making them familiar with the number system and simple addition and subtraction.

Every day maths'

An important part of children's learning in maths involves applying their skills to everyday problems and situations. Encouraging them to practise their maths skills in daily life will benefit them enormously e.g. Matching pairs of socks and shoes encourages them to use Matching pairs of socks and shoes encourages them to use mathematical language.

Make collections of things that are the same colour, shape, size.

Can they spot the odd one out from a group of items. We've collected some, conkers. Can they count them and add one more.
